
Local Policy is Critical


4 OF 10 REASONS


- ◆ Local policies can be *tailored* to individual community needs.
- ◆ Local initiatives raise community awareness and support.
- ◆ Local communities are *not burdened with bureaucracy* that often inhibits progress at the state and national levels.
- Local initiatives are a laboratory for broader policy change, providing valuable clues to the most effective and appropriate models.
