




Child Maltreatment Links with Sexual Violence & IPV

- Child Sexual Abuse (both sexual violence & child maltreatment)
- Child witnesses of IPV (may be also victims of child maltreatment)
- SV/IPV/Child Maltreatment Victimization → future victimization/perpetration of SV/IPV/Child Maltreatment
- Lots of Common Risk & Protective Factors





















Experiential Evidence Methods

- Focus groups

Example

_____ will use a **single-case design** for their evaluation. The Native community has specified that all families must have access to the program's services based on their interests and needs as a family. Families may not be excluded from services based on research specifications or the evaluation approach to be implemented. Including a "control" group was not an option based on cultural views and concerns. As a result, random case assignment, wait list, or quasi-experimental designs were not acceptable in concept.








