- IPV & Pregnancy and Reproductive Coercion
- LOTS of work around LGBTQ people and communities and SV prevention with those communities (and the people in them)
- I am working on an RPE grant in a very small community with a history of trauma related to sexual violence, domestic violence, and more.
- I work with Native American communities that have experienced extensive historical and contemporary trauma and I'm wondering how to do effective prevention and intervention work in that context.

- I work with students who are victims of SA, DV, etc
- vulnerable and underrepresented communities are experience multiple forms of violence in daily lives
- I work with elementary students, teaching them about body safety and empowerment. I also teach parenting classes, among other things.
- Our agency (Verity Sonoma County) has a dedicated prevention department within our rape crisis center that focuses on prevention for all age ranges across our entire county. Doingw ork not only in schools, but with migrant workers and incarcerated youth.
- historical trauma, patterns of trauma in families
- I'm the Prevention Services Manager for the Rape Crisis Dept at YWCA Silicon Valley
- I am a prevention coordinator in Richmond, VA. A setting with communities that face trauma on a daily basis with DV, community violence, poverty.
- Through RPE primary prevention work
- Positive ways to talk about consent and relationships when talking with middle school and high school students some of whom have experienced trauma (I am a prevention education specialist)
- Child Sexual Abuse Prevention in Elementary Schools (curriculum based)
- Two things hope for the community, and using horrible events as catalysts for change for all.
- incarcerated youth & youth on probation current trauma, historical trauma, violent neighborhoods
- Very passionate about prevention of IPV and SV
- The historical trauma is so easy for those of us in the dominant class to dismiss but is so vitally important.
- community responses to disclosures informed by widespread vicarious & primary trauma
- historical and contemporary trauma very frequently comes up in any prevention discussion, though not usually in those words!
- We fund programs for thousands of girls and women, and are finding that trauma affects not only the victim, but also the provider - "vicarious trauma" in service providers
- I work on a large public university and thinking about first generation students, queers students and students of color and how and if to shift our content to mee the needs of these groups
- *meet
- I manage a positive parenting home viisting program. The majority of our families have experienced trauma in their lives which can effect their parenting. I see our work as prevention in that we can educate and support parents in making different choices then their parents did.
- Child sexual abuse curriculum for Erin's Law here in Illinois
- Working with Sexual Assault Survivors this topic is very important to learn more interventions, also, I want to know how does this topic connect to Chronic illness and dieases.
- work with victims of domestic violence. We provide education, counseling, and shelter. and court support for indivivuals at risk for and victims of domestic violence

- I'm interested in learning more about prevention work in various communities that have experienced sexual violence.
- we also do collaborations with health centers and get a bit of time within comprehensive sex ed programming done in schools through other agencies
- Here at the New York City Anti-Violence Project, we work around violence within and against LGBTQ and HIV-affected communities, and we are really interested in looking at how to use prevention work to address intersecting forms of violence that reinforce oppression around intersecting identities (race, class, ethnicity, age, immigration and HIV status, sexual orientation and gender identity), and what happens to LGBTQ and HIVaffected people when they reach out for help.
- Many of my community members that I do RPE with have also experianced gun violence...
- I am conducting research with African American and White youth in urban communities, and also parents, to identify the emotional challenges and stress of adolescents. In my work with elementary aged children, adolescents, and parents, trauma is always present and manifests in diverse ways. Yet I don't find that people are engaged in interventions.

- You know, the view that it is so much worse today when they are living in the denial of their own trauma responses. Right!
- i used to be a camp counselor in the pocono mountains in pa, we had kids from the innner city of philly with horrible lifes back home. They would come to camp and have the time of their life for a month. It was the worst feeling to have to send them home, i just wanted to take them all home with me

- Whenever I address spanking in parenting classes, I hear variations of "Well, I survived it, didn't I?" It's always really hard to actually get people to open up.
- Yes, I understand! Retraumatizing them.
- To resolve conflict, we often start by finding what both parties agree on. Maybe the way to be successful here is to show how these root causes impact us all
- True!
- That the root causes are the common ground

- Healing Circles!! This is the key, a way to share our thoughts and feelings without fears.
