Primary Prevention: a <u>systematic</u> process that <u>promotes</u> healthy <u>environments</u> and behaviors and reduces the likelihood of an incident, condition, or injury <u>before</u> it occurs in the first place (from Prevention Institute, <u>www.preventioninstitute.org</u>)

Prevention Definitions:

- Primary: Before violence takes place (upfront)
- Secondary: Immediate responses (in the thick)
- Tertiary: Long term responses (aftermath)




