- "We've been defining the problem as a problem and not defining ourselves as helping people." - Annie
- Trauma informed services provided across community systems, i.e., schools, social services, and wouldn't it be something if JDFS systems were trauma informed?
- And trauma-informed prevention is absolutely possible and necessary.
- Opps, Department of Jobs & Family Services or TANIF Systems
- How do we serve this ten year old child with an understanding of his multi-generational context of trauma?
- In NY, our coalition has been working with a program on a reservation to ensure the service providers who are part of the reservation have the NY state Rape Crisis Training
- We know that violence/trauma is multigenerational I am very grateful for the tool offered to highlight that we carry our ancestors and our her/story in our DNA
- so by extrapolation, providing training for the people who are already in the community, providing services
- This is the actual Debra) - I keep thinking of the point that across the issues we are talking about, none of us will truly succeed without all of us succeeding
- Have to address multiple forms of oppression.
- And intergenerational oppression.
- Beth and Corina discussion - we can't just focus on just the child, but the whole community needs healing.
- What i appreciate about TIC is that we ask what has happened to you? not why do you do what you are doing? this is a game changing for this child and for the advocate
- We are seeing more and more pre-k children being suspended because of the lack of understanding of oppression and trauma.
- "None of us will truly succeed without all of us succeeding." YES

- Is it possible part of the pblem with vision creep is who is doing the creeping or even inviting?

- In ,my experience, the difficult financial environment is a great opportunity to leverage expertise and resources across multiple expertise/organizations. The power of going together for joint funding requests with the continuum of care being highlighted to funders.
- Collective impact and community collaboration
- Debra again - here in Ohio we are also in a planning process around adolescent health where cross sector work is finding a place to happen
- There are also trends in a larger embrace of the Adverse Childhood Experiences study that also provide the data tools to convince why we all need to partner.
- "Evaluation is our friend and not that big scary monster in the corner."

- Deb again - focusing on policy and environmental health is also coming up across the public health field - nutrition, physical activity and obesity prevention is working on these areas of prevention also
- I'm curious how people are evaluating their "embedding" and collaborations - is there a tool or a way to asses if our additional collaboration are making a bigger reach or impact?
- Here in CT the RPE program had historically been under MCH but we are moving it under Injury to foster better collaboration

- In the collective impact effort to mitigate the impact of exposure to violence on children here in Louisville, we made a clear decision to include ALL types of violence, from DV/IPV to gun violence, bullying etc. This has brought many more partners to the table, community folks, etc.
- Society uses terms to make children sub-human
- Yes, that was the same for my teachings and the community is seen as family.
- "The children no longer become cases or problems or clients - they're relatives"
- 1) More opportunities via federal funds, with emphasis on collaboration, 2) Toooften we see the nexus of these violences/oppressions in the results with people (school violence/guns/sucidide/SV/TDV). These examples make this shift not only possible but urgent.

- It might be different between state and local levels, right? At state level systems and local level as you mentioned, neighborhood/community specific.
- substance abuse prevention professionals; teen pregnancy prevention; dept of education;
- Department of Education, Department of Health, Child maltreatment, fatherhood coalition
- Several parts of the city, police, safe neighborhood initiatives, theater company, local university researcheers for the evaluation, human services, health department, non-profits addressing kids and youth issues, hospitals

- And home visitation programs!

- Suicide prevention, youth violence prevention, school-based health centers, schools, fatherhood programs, colleges, Teen pregnancy prevention, substance abuse, arts programs.
- Beth - youth and parents and community members
- Definitely on local level, the workgroups/chapters/teams that get the work done and on the state level folks who have the ability and support to influence and change policy
- In a state of 159 counties, we have only 27 SACs. This lends itself to increasing the role of Public Health in initiating these type of efforts.
