What is Expected "normative" sexual development?

- How does it get hijacked?
- Is sexually aggressive behavior on the part of males "deviant" or "overcompliance" with cultural norms/expectations?
- Is seeing self as a consumable object "deviant" or "over-compliance" with cultural norms/expectations for girls?





-Late Childhood (9-12)


