AT KidSafe we provide comfortable language through the KidSafe children's book My Body is Special and Belongs to Me - an easy conversation to start at a very young age - helping the adults understand Normailizes conversations for worried parents.

We also talk with the adults about their cultural issues that they bring to this conversation.

misunderstanding between "developmentally expected behaviors" and saying that a behavior is ok There is a responsibility for parents to talk to children and an emphasis in conservative communities this provides materials to allow parents to do this. Beth Malchus in Ohio

Parents worry if they give their child sexual information, their child will go and tell all their friends Many parents share that they simply dont have the language and comfort level about talking about "it" We find redefining the "it" to sending a healthy message from a young age can be so simple. "Your body is speacial, and belongs to you." In our seminars we aim to create some humor, and comfort we have been working in ethnocultural communities where staff/organizaitons have been gate keepers...important to find early adopters in community to bridge. we have found if we could talk from a "medical" perspective then more conservative groups are open. our name is the Calgary Sexual Healthy Sexual Development in Children

**Becoming Sex-Wise** 

Both workshops will be presented at the National Children's Advocacy Center's International Yes, our challenge is always around getting parents and people who work with children to the table. Some families and communities aren't just wary of kids learning about sex in schools or parents having control over the conversation, but they believe that sex is valuable as a mystery to be The workshops happening in India right now teach children about their "danger zones" that no one is Living West, Facing East

We've found that it is a good approach to tell parents that if they do not talk to their kids about what kind of relationships they have (sexual or otherwise), they will hear about it from society around them. I think we can empower parents to talk to kids about the kind of adult relationships they want we teach children starting at age 4 using our two award winning childrens books - the books are for children but have a section for adults on how to use the book with kids - "My Body is Special and Grandparents and elders are an untapped resource!!

We have done a personal space activity that helps teenagers realize when someone begins to cross their boundaries and make them feel uncomfortable.
