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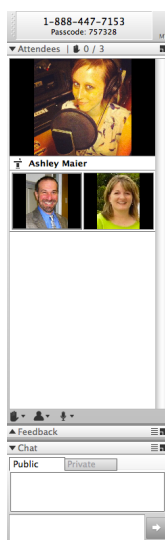

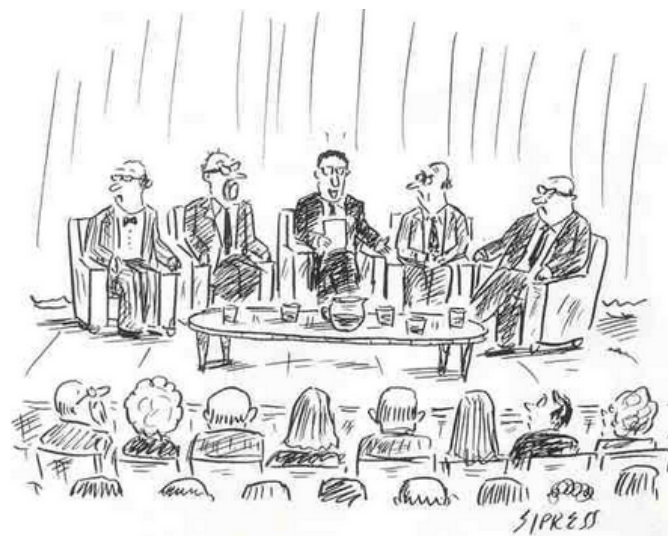

A Public Health Approach to Violence

- Focuses on **prevention**
- **Population**-based
- Reduces **risks**
- Increase **resilience**

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Links Between Health and Violence

Youth exposed to violence are at significantly higher risk for:

- Multiple mental health conditions
- Depression and risk for suicide
- Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
- Aggressive and/or violent behavior disorders

Violence affects the physical, biological, environmental, social, behavioral and emotional changes that influence health.

Violence and Chronic Illness



A growing body of science is consistently linking violence (the experience with and/or fear of) with risk for and incidence of a range of serious physical health problems. The effects of violence on health are a consequence of the physical, biological, environmental, social, behavioral, and emotional changes that violence imposes on all of us. While it has been long understood that violence has implications for emotional and physical injury, it is only relatively recently that we are beginning to recognize the long-term effects that ripple on extensive toll on the broader health status of individuals, families and communities. These health

Health consequences include :

- Asthma
- Significant alteration of Healthy Eating and Activity
- Heart Disease and Hypertension
- Ulcers and Gastrointestinal Disease
- Diabetes
- Neurological Diseases
- Musculoskeletal Diseases
- Lung Disease

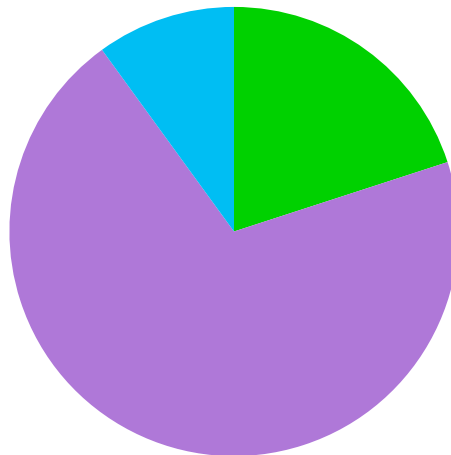

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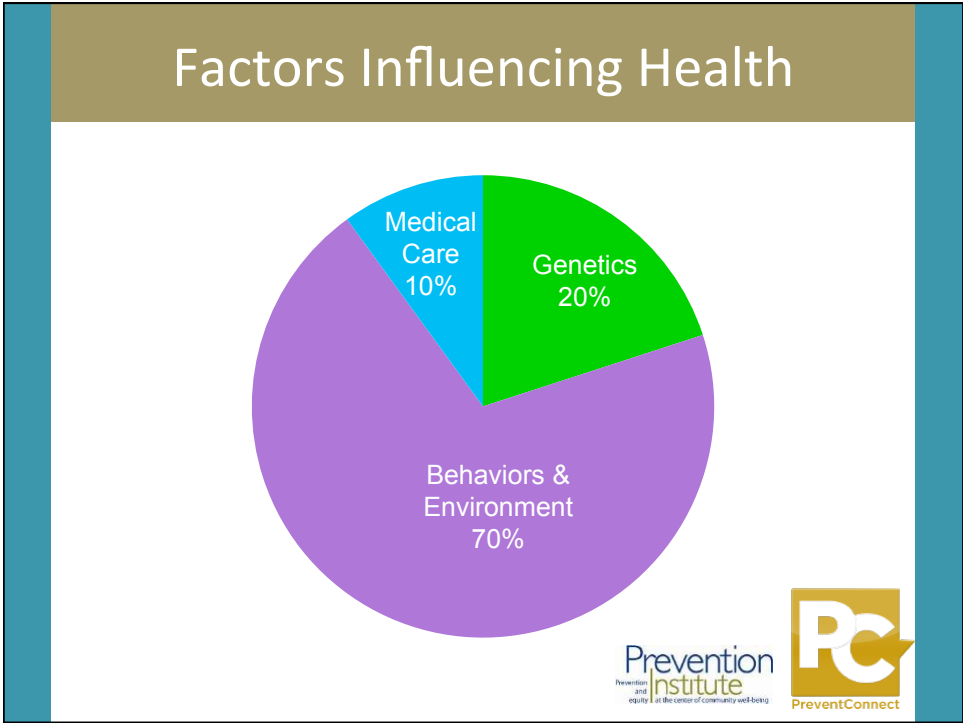

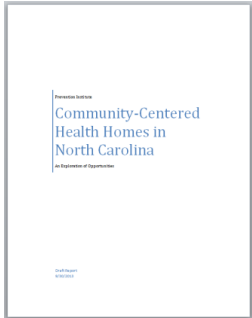

“The conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age that influence their opportunities for a healthy, productive life.

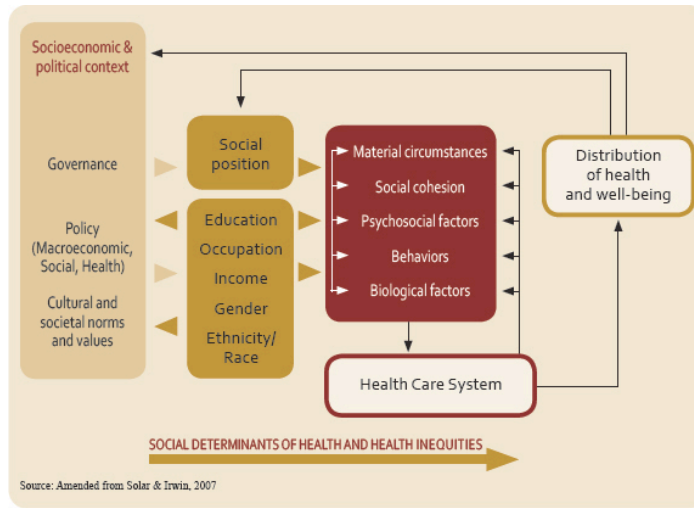
These circumstances are shaped by access to money, power and resources at global, national and local levels.

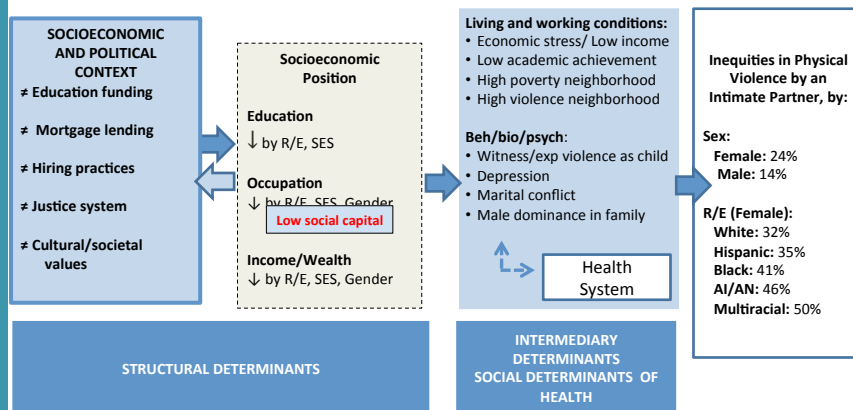

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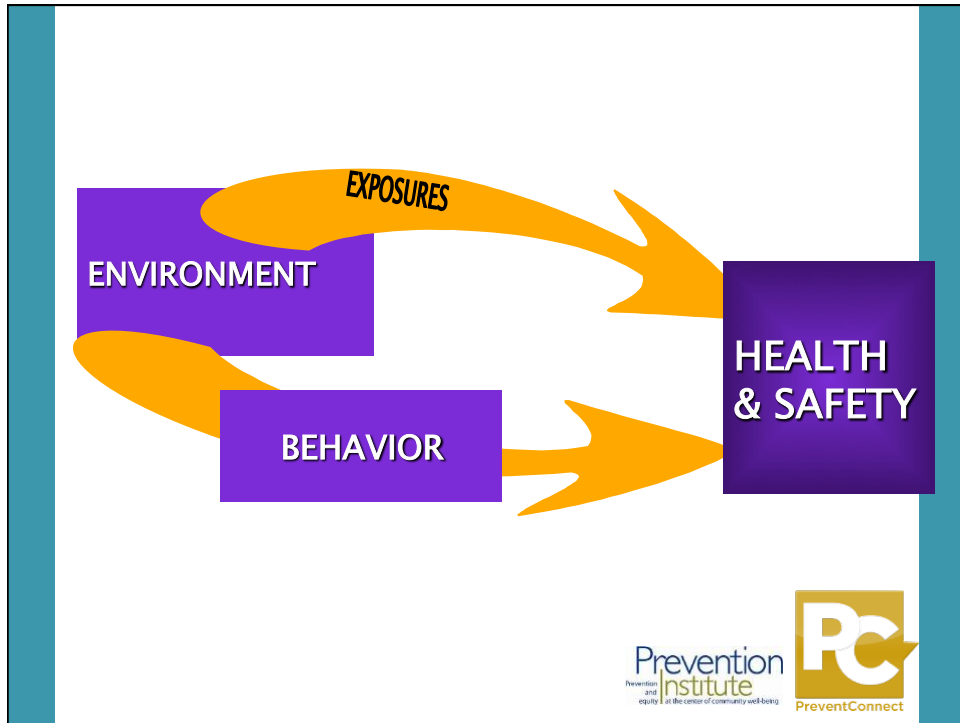

- Attainment of the highest level of health for all people
- Achieving HE requires valuing everyone equally with focused and ongoing societal efforts to address avoidable inequalities, historical and contemporary injustices, and the elimination of health and health care disparities

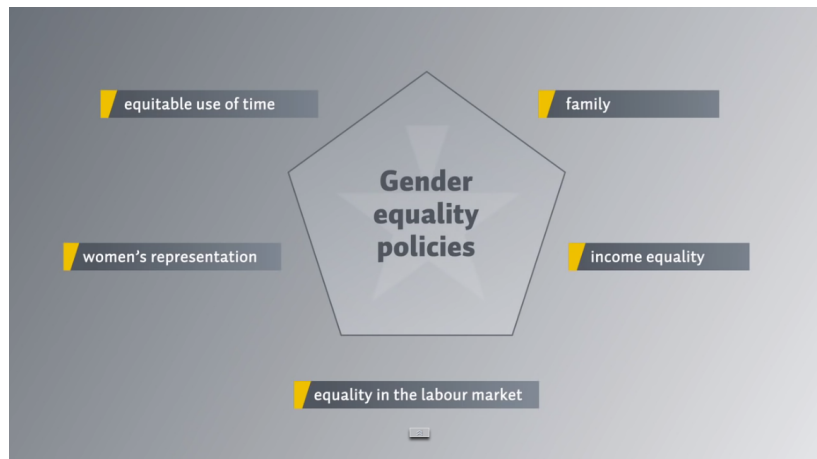
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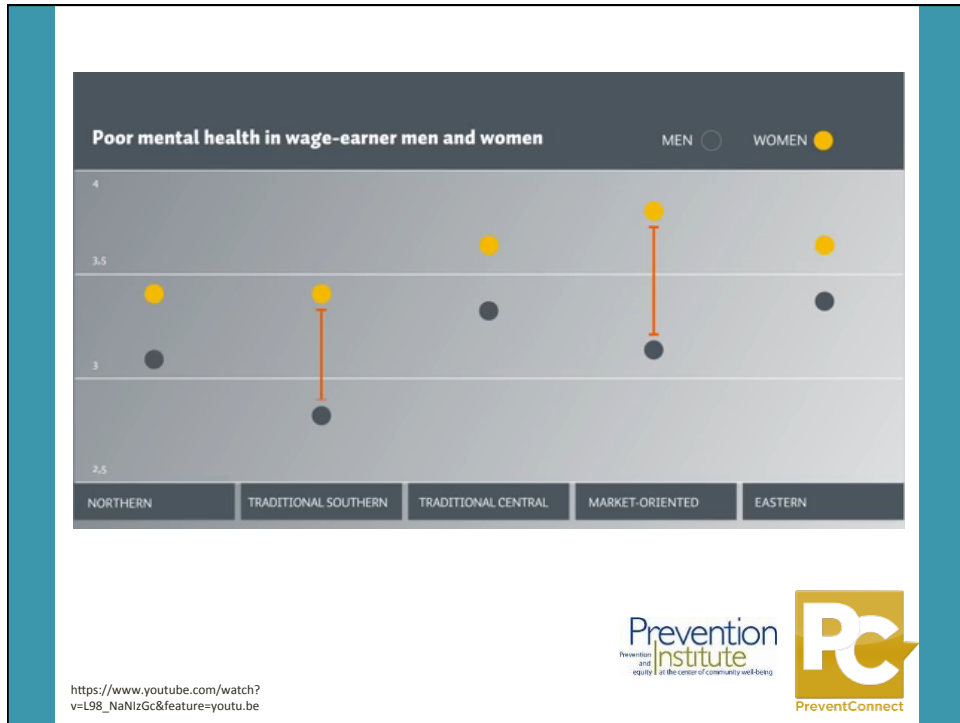
