


Reciprocal Advancement

- Released in 2015
- Not enough funding
- Sexual violence often marginalized in dual organizations
- Significant and relevant distinctions between the two fields are not made



Sexual Assault Demonstration Initiative (SADI)

- Released in 2017
- Organizational change & programmatic change at 6 sites over a 4-year period
- Enhance sexual assault outreach, services, and community partnerships in dual/multi-service programs
- Found heavy focus on domestic violence, invisibility of sexual assault





History of distinct fields

- Fields emerged at the same time with different socio-cultural impulses & political trajectories
- Field has become more scientific based and less politically based
- Has become more professionalized
- Social service v. social justice





Ideologically - Reciprocal Advancement



Practice - Reciprocal Advancement


- Integrate prevention strategies





- Focus on community and societal change




