ML: Parent Leadership Initiative for Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention

HC: We also work with parents on parenting after trauma in shelter, and have in-shelter programming for children and teens including psycho-educational groups. Our programs have been shown to have a significant positive impact utilizing the Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire.

CK: Wonderful programming! Thanks to all for sharing - you're doing amazing work!!

HC: Our in-shelter programming is based on ARC (Attachment, Regulation, and Competency), and we also make send people to a local therapist who uses Trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy (TF-CBT).
