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





Highly prevalent

- About 1 in 4 adult women and 1 in 7 men in the U.S have experienced severe physical violence from a partner in their lifetime
- 16% of women and 7% of men have experienced contact sexual violence (i.e., rape, being made to penetrate someone else, sexual coercion, and/or unwanted sexual contact) from a partner in their lifetime
- 10% of women and 2% of men have been stalked by an intimate partner in their lifetime
- Nearly half (47%) of all women and men have experienced psychological aggression (e.g., humiliating or controlling behaviors)

- Starts early in the lifespan
 - 7% of adult women in the U.S. and 4% of men report first experiencing some form of partner violence before the age of 18
 - Among H.S. students dating in the past year, 21% of girls and 10% of boys reported either physical violence, sexual violence, or both forms of violence from a dating partner







- Associated with negative health and economic consequences
 - Physical injury and death
 - Cardiovascular, reproductive, gastrointestinal, and nervous system conditions
 - Mental health (e.g., depression, PTSD)
 - Missed days of school or work





- Connected to other forms of violence
- Shares common risk factors
- Is PREVENTABLE
- Requires a comprehensive approach targeting multiple risk and protective factors across the social ecology





IPV Technical Package

Select group of strategies with a focus on **PREVENTING** intimate partner violence from happening in the first place as well as approaches to **LESSEN** the immediate and long-term harms of intimate partner violence.




Benefits of a Technical Package


Technical packages are one of the six key components for effective public health program implementation


- Sharpen and focus what otherwise might be vague commitments to "action"
- Avoid a scattershot approach of a large number of interventions, many of which have only a small impact
- Achieve substantial and synergistic improvement in outcomes









Structure

- A Technical Package has three components:
 - Strategies: direction or actions to achieve the goal of preventing violence
 - Approaches: specific ways to advance the strategy
 - Example programs, practices, and policies
 - Evidence: for each approach in preventing violence or impacting its associated risk and protective factors

Considerations for Inclusion

- Example programs, policies, & practices selected based on the best available evidence:
 - Meta-analyses, systematic reviews, or rigorous evaluation studies showing impacts on perpetration, victimization or risk/protective factors
 - Beneficial effects on multiple forms of violence
 - Similar outcomes with different settings/ populations
 - Feasibility of implementation in U.S. if evaluated in another country
 - No evidence of harmful effects on specific outcomes or with subgroups


- First responder and civil legal protections
