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


Community Culture



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

What is Prevention through Liberation?

Pre-ven-tion (noun)

"The action of stopping something from happening or arising."

Lib·er·a·tion (noun)

"The act of setting someone free from imprisonment, slavery, or oppression; release."

"Freedom from limits on thoughts or behavior."





From an Aboriginal perspective, racism is one of the causes of family violence because it is a contributing factor within Aboriginal communities, which may lead to substance abuse, self-harm, and violence. This means that ongoing racism limits the effectiveness of prevention activities.

Anti-oppressive practices that promote violence prevention:

- Valuing and uplifting positive relationships
- Restoring community norms and resiliency
- Grounded empowerment
- Shoring up against exploitation and harm
- Moving upstream
- Deep listening and deep learning
- Understanding of historical trauma, woundedness, and healing

- Understanding of equity versus equality
- Collaboration
- Organizational and individual allyship
- Reframing concepts of leadership, organizational structures, and outcomes
- Navigating discomfort








Prevention Through Liberation Mini-Grants



Purpose: To increase organizational capacity for culturally specific or culturally responsive anti-oppression-based sexual violence prevention efforts in Oregon.

Culturally specific services are created by and for specific cultural communities with an emphasis on the voices and experiences of survivors of interpersonal violence (such as sexual violence, domestic violence, stalking, dating violence, etc).

Tips from Keri and Agustin

- Oppression is a root cause of sexual and domestic violence. Therefore, doing antioppression work is violence prevention.
- Act as a facilitators of change. Communities are the agents of change.
 - help build capacity so that communities have the power to shape their environments and relationships


