AB: collaboration helps us all

JO: Collaboration allows us to hear different viewpoints and perspectives - there's not one single way to address the problem

KB: able to achieve greater impact; knowledge sharing; fostering accountability

TS: covering more ground

MT: Community efforts re a huge part of prevention

AB: no need to reinvent the wheel

MJ: Community accountability, increase protections from trauma risks, decreased risks of trauma --- end racism & gender-based violence

PS: prevent more. Support survivors and community better through more collaboration

KK: More partners/community members need to be involved to champion the efforts and increase effectiveness and sustainability

PS: Influence cultural shifts more towards anti-oppression, etc.

MN: I am working with bars for a healthy nightlife

CL: WA AG's office, King County Prosecutor's Office, Organization for Prostitution Survivors, Businesses Ending Slavery and Trafficking, Seattle Against Slavery and Center for Children and Youth Justice

BT: I am partnering with the local university, high schools and exploring the option of partnering with marijuana dispensaries

AB: I applied and interviewed for my city's planning commission 0

JG: Rape crisis centers, SARTS, schools, churches, and internal security trainings and community health improvement

KS: Technology companies to come up with localized solutions to technology abuse

JM: Schools, law enforcement, faith based, mental and substance abuse centers

MJ: Are there risks (e.g. complicity) and how can those risks be balanced with meaningful community accountability, when engaging with a powerful sector (e.g., professional sports team)?

KP: We are funded by Blue Shield to do IPV prevention with a workforce development org, a child abuse/family violence org, a media org, and a city dept. (us). We're also hoping to bring in other sectors. We are focusing on the Bay view neighborhood of SF.

PS: Neighborhood block clubs, city district managers, and city department of general services

KP: @Monte I'm really interested in this question because we were talking about engaging sports (ex. Warriors) since one of our orgs works with them for workforce development.

PS: We recently realized that using IPV, risk and protective factors was not simple language for many partners so we are now thinking of ways to convey this information in different and more simple and more relatable terms- social or community connectedness helps decrease violence with examples.

EP: @Loren NNEDV has some resources on that on their website, via <u>techsafety.org</u>. they have a yearly conference on confidentiality.

AKJ: @Phalguna yes! I think making our language accessible to more of the community is so necessary

AKJ: Do our partners really need to know the social ecological model or do they just need to understand the concept, which they probably already do, based on their own work and experience!

AKJ: That's just an example, but we use a lot of language that doesn't necessarily mean anything outside of our offices
