- Child Abuse Prevention and Training Act in California fudning child sexual absue prevention work in the 1980s
- Battered Mothers Custody Conference founded 2003 by Professor Mo Hannah,
 Attorneys Joan Meier (George Washington U) & Barry Goldstein, Wendy Murphy,
 Garland Waller and others; trying to bring attention to the crisis in family law courts
 abusers regularly awarded unsupervised access AFTER children and their mothers bring
 disclosures to therapists, attorneys, custody evaluators. Garland Waller's documentaries
 "Small Justice" and "No Way Out But One."
- seeing the vision begin to shift from blaming a teen for sexual activity to recognition of vulnerability
- invention of Twitter and Facebook, and the stories shared on EverydaySexism
- Sandusky case brought attention from mainstream sports
- I'm Somebody program developed to address needs of children with disabilties
- Child sexual abuse and at the same time the mother is victim of domestic violence trying to get her child and herself away from abuser.

 present publicly and need training.

- What activities do you find helpful to get the the deeper conversations?

- Publication of survivor's memoirs ("Spilled Milk" in 2013; "Come Back!" by Mia and Claire Fontaine; "Harvesting Stones" by Paula Lucas) and fictionalized stories of survivors "Crows Over a Wheatfield" by Paula Sharp and "Black and Blue" by Anna Quindlen.
- It sounds the same as doing participant-centered work. Letting the audience/participant/survivor say what they need.
- I love story telling...favorite part. I do believe you can make a bigger impact with a great story.
- What was the timeline for gathering the stories from around the state?
- We've utilized Photovoice as a tool to explore primary sexual violence prevention with local communities and for leadership at the state level
- Memoir "Boys Don't Tell" by Randy Ellison.
- *in Wyoming
- Weaving 3-4 survivor stories into a dramatic reading so that people see the individual aspect, as well as common themes - then we do a facilitated small group discussion session about what people have heard.

- It's very powerful
- Joan's Bystander Intervervention publications by NSVRC can be turned into activities, and ppl like that for concrete things to do
- I tasked soldiers with creating a skit for new soldiers and then had the participants break the skit down into what was right and wrong, and then the participants would restructure the skit to a prevention/bystander intervention and then perform it for the audience
- Creative and fun for such a hard topic to work with
- ppl need activities and concrete plans
- I remember those phones coming out!
- great ideas! interaction and actually acting it out is a good learning tool.
- I always kept a therapist on hand in case someone became overwhelmed
- pcar has a great presentation Where We Live. its about small things everyone can do every day to prevent child SA
