

### Challenges to funding

- Child sexual abuse viewed as too big, too overwhelming; a black hole
- Funders many not believe it is indeed preventable
- All need to see solutions; highlight what is promising, inspiring & working!







### **Growing Consensus**

- Healthcare expenditures cost the US \$2.8 trillion a year.
- There is growing consensus to reduce healthcare spending through prevention.

#### CA Successful No Smoking Campaign

- From 1989 to 2008, the state of California invested \$2.4 billion from cigarettes taxes and into the California Tobacco Control Program
- The investment saved \$134 billion in reduced medical expenditures!



- Replication studies: Multiple tiers of studies by entities not affiliated with the developer
- Achieving Evidence-Based Practice(EBP) status:
   The gold standard







- Administer the standards for SORNA and AWA
- Provide technical assistance and assistance with SORNA implementation and:
  - Administering grant programs
  - Operating NSOPW
  - Collaborating with other OJP offices to support evidence-based and promising programs
  - Informing about a broader scope of sex offender management activities needed to ensure public safety







# SOMAPI: Sex Offender Management Assessment and Planning Initiative



- Common Goal: to protect the public from sex offenders and prevent sexual violence
- A variety of policies and programs exist but little is known about "what works"
- SOMAPI: identify evidence based practices and gaps/ needs of the field, and provide guidance for adults and for youth


